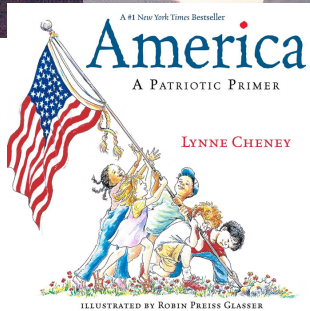

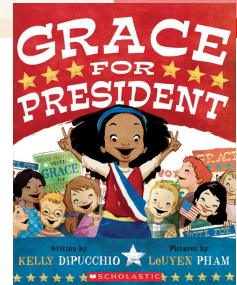

An ABC of the principles on which this country was founded.



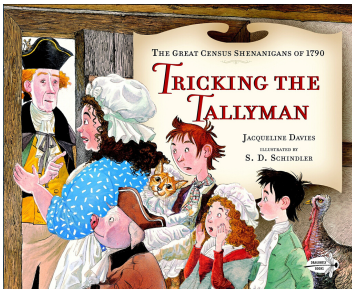
Maybe Something Beautiful: How Art Transformed a Neighborhood

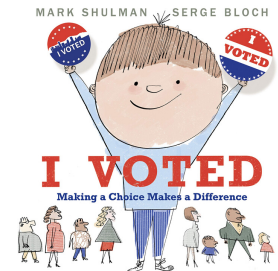
Tricking the Tallyman

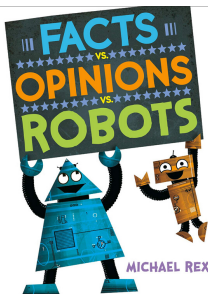
Vote for Our Future!

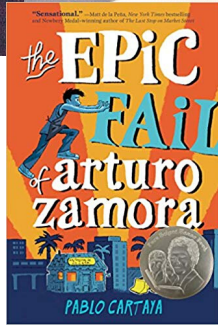


Being an Active Citizen and My Government

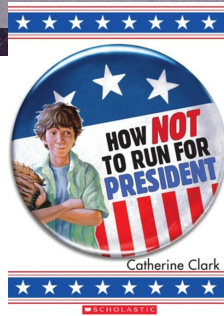

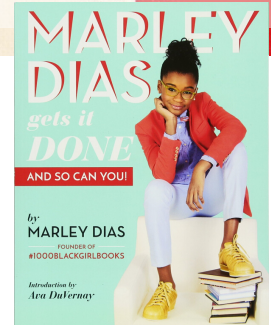
The Epic Fail of Arturo Zamora by Pablo Cartaya

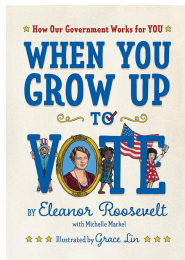
How NOT to Run for President by Catherine Clark

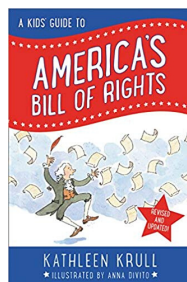
Ban This Book by Alan Gratz

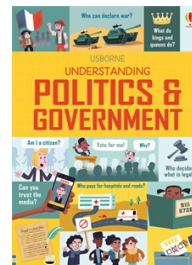
Book Uncle and Me by Uma Krishnaswami

Understanding politics is essential to understanding the world around you. This attractive and highly readable book explains all forms of governments and electoral systems and ideologies.

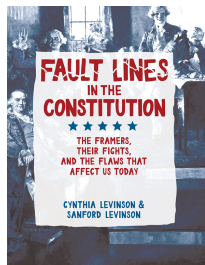

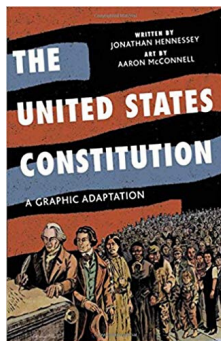
March Books 1-3

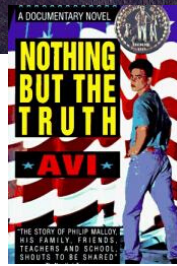
Fault Lines in the Constitution

Examines the Constitutional origins of modern-day political problems and outlines solutions for these issues.



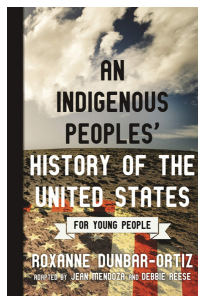
The United States Constitution

by Coral Celeste Frazer

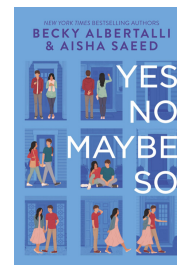
